

Most of us have neighbors. Depending on where we live, the neighbors may be close or they may be at some distance. Where I live the neighbors are so close that we can hear when they pull into their driveway or close their back door. For others you may have to drive up the road to see your neighbors. Near or far, the neighbors are there, and to some extent we probably know who they are and we know something about them.

Then there are the less known neighbors. These are the ones we know are there, but we rarely see them, and we don't know much about them. We see the house and we know someone lives there. The light is on and the car is in the driveway. On occasion we see them leave the house, but we don't know where they may be going. It is possible that we don't even know their names, and likely that we don't know anything personal about them. They are, in a sense, our mystery neighbors. To those of you who live on a street where "everybody knows everybody," this may sound very strange. Trust me, there are plenty of folks who know just what I am saying.

To many people in the community, a church can be like the mystery neighbor. They know we are here. They see people coming and going, never knowing who most of them are. Though they have perceptions, accurate or not, they really don't know what the mystery neighbors are doing when they are inside the building. Should they dare visit the mystery neighbors? How much of a risk would that be? What kind of reception would they receive? Would they even like the neighbors? Whether out of apprehension or simple apathy, the church will have a multitude of potentially well-known neighbors who will remain unknown simply because they will not take the initiative to make the connection.

Yes, a few will dare to come. They will take a chance on the mystery neighbors on South Fourth Street. For this reason, it is imperative that the church *always* have the "welcome mat" out. To borrow a phrase from Nathan Hullum, we should always bring our "A game" of hospitality when we are gathered. Those who come through our door are our honored guests, and should receive that message in every way possible.

Whereas a few will dare to come, there are scores who will not. If the connection is to be made, it will be up to the church to make it. A bridge must be built between the church and the community, and God has designed the church to be in the bridge building business. I realize that to some this may sound intimidating. "Is the preacher talking about the e-word?!" What I'm talking about is relationships, connecting with people in a way that a bridge is built between the life they live and the life of Christ through the people of Christ's church. In order for that to happen, the people of the church must connect with the people of the community in increasingly meaningful ways, and much of it will happen on their turf, not ours.

Bridge building can be intimidating. I encourage you to do it anyway. You will find that building bridges is blessed work. It is blessed work because it is God's work. God never intended for His church to be mystery neighbors.
