

Country Clubs and Mission Outposts

"When Jesus had called the Twelve together, he gave them power and authority to drive out all demons and to cure diseases, and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal the sick." (Luke 9:1-2)

In his episcopal address to open this year's annual conference session, Bishop Scott Jones spoke briefly about the contrast between what a local church is intended to be and what a local church often becomes. The images he used were of mission outposts and country clubs. Realizing the natural tendency to drift from the former to the latter, it may be a healthy practice to consider which our congregation most resembles.

Though I have never been a member of a country club, I think the concept seems pretty uncomplicated: you pay your membership dues, which then allows you to enjoy the services and opportunities provided by the club. Sure, some members may be called to step up and actually work by serving on a board of directors or in other various ways, but this is not necessarily a requirement. In general, country club membership boils down to pay, consume and enjoy.

In contrast, a mission outpost is a base established so that a person or organization can pursue the purpose of their existence in a distant location. Though the mission may be initiated from far away, the outpost provides a way for the mission to be carried out regularly and effectively. It is an extension of the "home office," so to speak. The United States has military bases throughout the world. Governments have embassies in foreign countries. Explorers establish base camps and scientists build research stations. All of these illustrate the concept of a mission outpost. We "set up shop" wherever the work needs to be done.

Don't get me wrong; there is nothing wrong with country club membership. My point (as was Bishop Jones' point) is that the local church was designed to function like a mission outpost. Observing Jesus' ministry as described in the gospel accounts, or the ministry of the apostles in Acts, it is difficult to picture their life bearing much resemblance to country club membership. Whether during his earthly life or after his resurrection, Jesus understood himself to be on a mission. He also

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compelled his disciples to live with a mission mindset. How we see our life together in the local church affects the mentality we adopt. If we see our life together like a country club, the mindset we will likely develop is one of *rights*. We've made the investment, and now we have a right to the benefits. On the other hand, if we see our life together like being sent to a mission outpost, the mindset we develop will be one of *responsibilities*. We have agreed to take the mantle of the one who called us, and we now live as servants of the given mission.

Jesus established a regional ministry out of Peter and Andrew's home (Mark 1:29-34). It was a mission outpost, not a country club. Lydia offered her home in Philippi to the ministry of Paul, Silas and Timothy, another example of a mission outpost. In these and other instances we could say that the Kingdom of God added another outreach station, a place established to serve the purpose of the Gospel. Our local churches are meant to be the very same thing. The local church isn't established for the benefits of members. It is established for the work of Jesus Christ in a local community. For those of us who have been in church for a long, long time, that is a truth we know very well, yet forget very easily. Let us not forget, my friends, that we are on a mission. Our comfortable facility on South Fourth Street is not our country club. It is our mission outpost.

Recipe Correction from the RMUMC Cookbook



The Pecan Pie Mini Muffins from the UMW tea were made with a recipe from our own cookbook (given by Becky Hardy). The recipe has an error. The corrected recipe follows:

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup all purpose flour
1 cup chopped pecans

2/3 cup butter, melted 2 eggs, beaten

In a bowl, combine brown sugar, flour and pecans; set aside. Combine butter and eggs, mix well. Stir into flour mixture just until moistened. Fill greased and floured, or paper lined miniature muffin pans 2/3 full. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes or until done. Remove immediately to cool on wire racks. Yield: about 2.5 dozen.
